How do we understand our role as researchers and designers and consider the impact of our work?



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

#### REFLECTING ON HARM REDUCTION AND TRAUMA CENTERED PRACTICES

#### Lack of trauma-informed perspectives

The research methods taught in this course felt extremely extractive and dehumanizing. There was very limited discussion around cultural sensitivity and care-based practices that prioritize participant safety and belonging. Throughout the process, I felt extremely paralyzed and unable to voice my concerns. At multiple instances, I witnessed how participants' lived experiences were being reduced to extract "insights". When discussions about sensitive topics came up during research, there was a failure to provide space to pause and reflect. The inherent disposability of user participants and using their experiences to further the research agenda was very uncomfortable.

#### Failure to center Disabled experiences

The project did not include people who are receiving care, despite the area of focus being caregiving. A significant portion of folks who receive care are Disabled. The lack of intentionality to center their experiences, when they are being impacted by the work, is a major red flag. User interviews throughout the multistep research process were only limited to caregivers. Often, the underlying assumption being that caregivers can speak for the folks who are under their care. Such an approach that fails to center disabledness is inadequate and lackluster, reproducing able-bodied norms that render Disabled folks invisible.
